COLLEGE COURSES IN MAINE HISTORY

The Maine Academic Historians, at its first meeting, determined to conduct an annual survey of the courses being offered in Maine history by the colleges and universities within the State, and the project was undertaken in the Spring of 1973. An effort has been made to also include a brief description of the contents of the course, the texts used, special requirements, frequency of offering and the instructors' names. Although the response to our first survey was not overwhelming, we are able to offer this tentative listing, with the expectation that additional information and corrections, if any, will be available next year.

College of the Atlantic

"Maine Coast History to 1860"

3 credit hours

A survey of early explorations and first settlements along the Maine coast with emphasis on economic development, early environmental history, relations with the native population, relations with England, France, Canada, and Massachusetts, and the local history of selected regions.

"History of Aroostook"

3 credit hours

Evening Division

A history of the Aroostook region of Maine from the earliest times to the present, including Indians and explorers, lumbering and pioneer farming, the boundary controversy and Aroostook War, and railroads and potato farming.

A study of the geographical, historical and cultural background for a history of the State of Maine.
