Maine's industries, agriculture, and, as the photograph illustrates, its commercial life benefited enormously from the great migration from Quebec to New England that began in the early nineteenth century. Franco-American life is the subject of two comprehensive bibliographical studies in this issue. The first, by Université Laval's French-American historian Yves Roby, was delivered at a 1983 conference sponsored by the Minister of Intergovernmental Affairs at Trois Rivières, Quebec, and describes the literature on Franco-Americans in New England. The second, by Professor Emeritus Alice R. Stewart of the University of Maine, discusses in similar fashion the literature on Franco-Americans in Maine.
