COVER ILLUSTRATION: This issue celebrates the 150th anniversary of the University of Maine; particularly the period of time since the centennial celebration in 1965. The University of Maine was founded in 1865 as a Morrill land-grant university focused on teaching agriculture, science, military science, and engineering. Howard Segal argues that by looking at the vision for the University of Maine laid out in 1965 much can be gleaned about the that era of university administration. Peter Hoff shows us a complex story regarding the academic administrations of his three presidential predecessors during the 1960s. However, Schmitt and Hartin reveal that despite institutional changes, the growth of the University also paralleled developments across the nations in their case study of marine science research. Butterfield-Nagy expands this examination of academic diversification through a survey of an explosion of knowledge, which occurred over the last fifty years at Raymond H. Fogler library.
